Manager Commentary
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"I love deadlines. I like the whooshing sound they make as they fly by." Douglas Adams was most certainly not thinking of Brexit when he wrote that, and it's unlikely that Prime Minister Theresa May shares the sentiment, but nonetheless we are where we are. Nothing resolved – still.

Fortunately, this seems to have had little or no impact on most things, and any investor who had been scared of putting money to work in the UK because of Brexit fears has been missing out. During March, the FTSE

All-Share Index made a total gain (including income) of 2.7%, driven, arguably, by the fall in bond yields across many developed economies, as well as reasonable corporate results. March was the third strong month in a row, leading to a cumulative gain for the FTSE All-Share Index of 9.4% during the first quarter of 2019.

In positive stock news, OneSavings Bank produced exceptional results, growing its underlying earnings per share and dividends by 14%, and reporting a return on equity of 26%, while also maintaining a strong balance sheet. Although clearly in a strong position, it has announced its intention to merge with Charter Court Financial Services. This will result in a more diversified and more efficient combined group. For whatever reason – Brexit, exposure to the UK housing market, particularly buy to let – it seems most investors don't believe it's even worth paying less than seven times this year's

forecast earnings to buy the shares. We disagree and, barring very significant weakness in the UK economy, believe this company should continue to perform well.

Another major position for the fund is in Burford Capital. It is an innovator in litigation finance, a complicated area where Burford has established a market-leading position. Growth has been extremely rapid, as it reported an annual 24% increase in after-tax profit and a 14% increase in the dividend. Much like OneSavings Bank, the business generates a high return on equity – in Burford's case, 30%. This is generally a good sign, as it is indicative of a company with a strong business position and relatively strong barriers to competition.

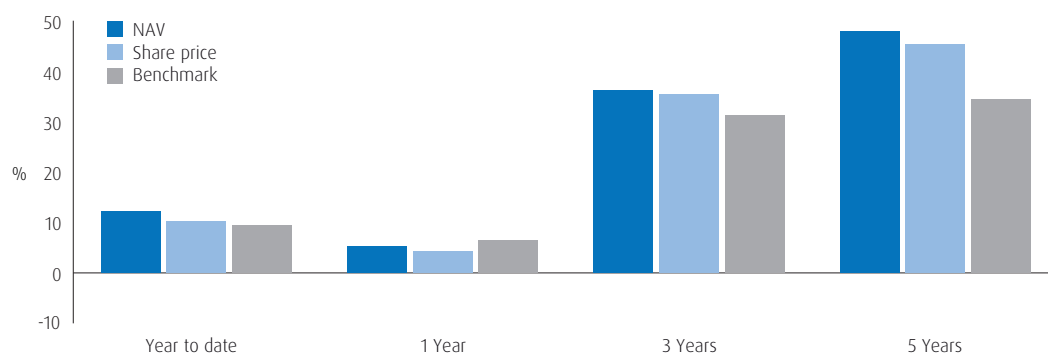

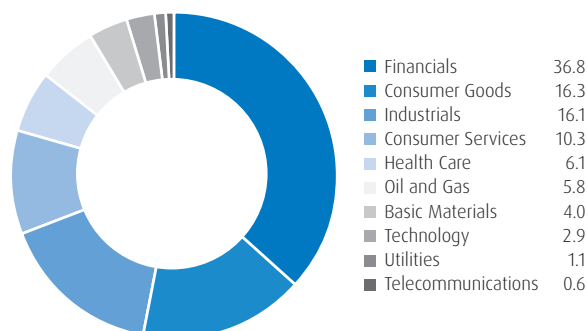

BMO Capital and Income Investment Trust seeks to achieve its objective of long-term capital and income growth by investing in companies with good long-term prospects which may not be fully reflected in their share prices; many of its stocks have a higher than average dividend yield. While the majority of holdings are in large and mid-cap UK companies, the Trust also invests in some smaller companies.

The Trust has built up an impressive record of paying dividends. In every year since the Trust's launch in 1992, it has succeeded in increasing the dividend paid to investors. Since 1998, the Trust has beaten the average dividend paid by the broad UK stock market (as represented by the FTSE All-Share Index). It has also significantly outpaced the rate of inflation as measured by the CPI (Consumer Price Index).

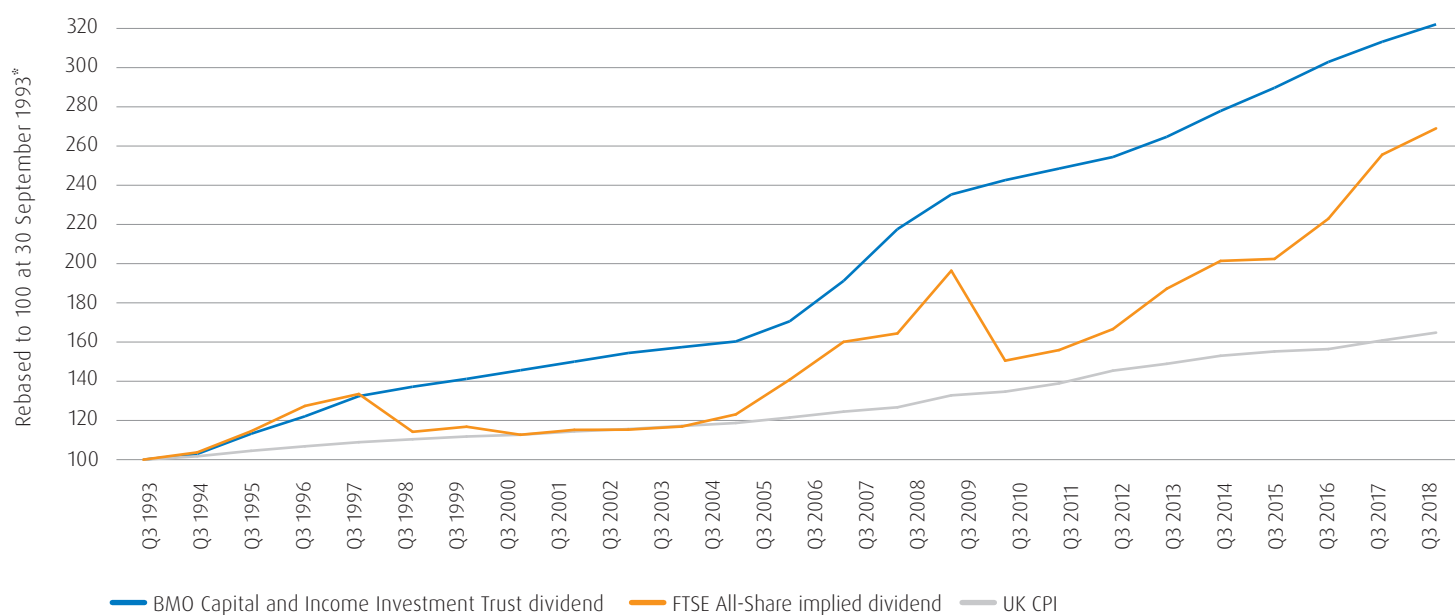
